The BRIDGE Housing Board of Directors elected four new directors: Stephen A. Richardson, Kiran Jain, Nadia Sager, and Douglas Bibby, adding depth and diversity to our governance as we sustainably grow our pipeline of affordable homes.

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Innovation

BRIDGE Housing acquired Terra Linda and Northview Manor in the Marin County community of San Rafael and Eaves in the San Mateo County community of Daly City, adding 320 units to our portfolio and ensuring long-term affordability for working families.

Highlights

Impact in Berkeley

BRIDGE celebrated the grand opening of Berkeley Way and the Hope Center, the largest affordable housing development and homeless services center in Berkeley's history, providing 89 affordable homes for families, 53 permanent supportive housing apartments, a 32-bed shelter, 12 transitional beds for veterans, and a community kitchen.

Impact in Portland

In Portland, BRIDGE celebrated the opening of Waterleaf, the second phase of Riverplace Parcel 3, delivering 178 new, affordable homes serving families earning 30-60% of Area Median Income and veterans in the amenity-rich South Waterfront area.

Since our founding in 1983, BRIDGE has grown to be one of the preeminent affordable housing providers on the West Coast. We've delivered more than 21,000 homes - nearly \$5.2 billion in new housing, from San Diego to Seattle. We have more than 30,000 residents in 13,500 units. And we deliver over 60,000 hours of services for our residents annually. BRIDGE has 18 important projects under development, bringing 1,530 new affordable homes to the communities we serve.

Philanthropy

BRIDGE received \$8 million from MacKenzie Scott's philanthropic organization, Yield Giving, the largest charitable gift in the organization's history, enhancing our capacity to address the affordable housing crisis for working families on the West Coast and provide meaningful services ranging from on-site childcare and homework clubs to financial literacy and senior wellness programs.

Services

Our team provided 10,850 households access to a range of on-site resident services, including summer and after school programs to support youth development and out-of-school time learning, service coordination to support housing and economic stability, health and wellness programs, and community-building activities. 5,068 households were provided with access to food security assistance programs.
